Course Description & Learning Outcomes

TWC 451/551 Explores issues related to copyright and intellectual property laws, with emphasis on electronic environment. Students will:

- define copyright and intellectual property rights
- identify and understand the various laws governing intellectual property in the United States and globally and analyze implications for the ownership and use of information
- understand and analyze the impact of technology on intellectual property laws
- understand and analyze the impact of intellectual property laws on the retrieval and use of information (print and electronic)
- understand and apply ethical standards for the use of information and technology within the realm of intellectual property and copyright
- understand the social, cultural, economic impact of intellectual property laws
- recognize, understand, and analyze the impact of intellectual property laws on the production, management, organization, and dissemination of information and knowledge

Discussion Posts: The due date for the *initial discussion post* and follows ups are listed in the Due Dates link. You will post one initial and one response to another student.

You may not post your *initial post* and your *response post* on the same day. The objective of the discussion board is to simulate an actual class discussion and if you only enter the classroom once a week, listen to some people and walk out, this cannot occur.

That said, your initial post should be 1-2 paragraphs (unless the specific directions for that week indicate otherwise) written in proper English (no texting) with correct grammar and use of conventions.

You will be unable to see the other students' posts until you have posted your main thread response. Your posts should demonstrate that you've read the module's reading assignments and are ready to apply the information.

Your posts should add to the discussion. This means that you do additional research (including a citation/link), give an example, etc. Please make sure to use an in-text citation within your response to indicate which information was derived from which source.

Please substantively respond to at least 1 other student's post. This means your response should add information to the discussion. Merely agreeing or saying "nice post" will earn 0 points.

Yellowdig Discussion: Yellowdig is a social media platform that will be used to discuss current happenings in IP or IP as it is related to your current/future career; as such it is student-driven. Please refer to the Canvas page that describes how Yellowdig works. This discussion will also help inform your annotated bibliography assignment.

Annotated Bibliography: As you work your way throughout this course, you should be making connections between what you are learning (in this course) and how it is applicable to either your current career field or your future career. For this assignment you need to focus on **one** specific career and its intersection with intellectual property. Specific directions for the annotated bibliography are available in Canvas.

Final Course Grades: This course does NOT carry the option of an incomplete grade. You may at any time (before the cut-off) elect to accept a grade of "Withdraw." Withdrawals are handled through your myASU account.
