### Course Description & Learning Outcomes

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As communications technologies have evolved, so too have our ways of communicating with others. With computers and other media technologies, the texts we create are no longer simply words on a printed page; they now include multimedia, web, audio, and visual design elements. Digital media introduce different possibilities for writing, organizing, designing, and presenting information in effective ways. This course introduces foundational concepts and technologies of writing for a variety of digital media.

By the conclusion of the course, you should be able to:

- Articulate the relationships between various types of media and texts
- Practice the multiple roles of the writer and editor in the world of digital media
- Analyze a variety of digital media texts for purpose, audience, style, and rhetorical appeals
- Design, produce, and use digital texts, images, video, and audio
- Demonstrate fluency with the tools and technologies that support writing for digital media
- Recognize basic HTML & CSS syntax

**Fulfilling the assignment requirements is "C" work** (acceptable). Assignments that earn an "A" or "B" exceed what was required in terms of quality (not necessarily quantity).

Because the work in this class is based on writing in the professional workplace, the following correspondence between grades and workplace standards will apply.

A	<b>Excellent work</b> that exceeds the assignment objectives and requirements.	Manager would be impressed and remember the work when considering a promotion for you.
B	<b>Good work</b> that meets the assignment objectives and requirements but requires minor improvements or demonstrates easily correctable problems.	Manager would be satisfied with the job, but not impressed.
C	<b>Adequate work</b> , but the design/content may require significant improvement.	Manager would be disappointed and ask you to revise or rewrite sections before allowing clients or others to see the work.
D	<b>Disappointing work</b> that meets some of the assignment objectives and requirements but not all.	Manager would be troubled by the poor quality of the work.
E	<b>Unacceptable work</b> that fails to meet the requirements of the assignment. This grade will also be assigned for any evidence of academic dishonesty.	Manager would be looking for someone else to replace you.
